<b>MARCH</b>	<b>18th</b> Medieval causes: miasma, planets, god and 4 humours	<b>19th</b> Treaty of Nonsuch was passed by Elizabeth to send 7,400 soldiers to the Netherlands to stop Spain gaining an important port	<b>20th</b> Land - German land taken to create Poland Army - 100,000 soldiers only Money - reparations (damages of £6.6 billion) Blame - Germany blamed for causing WW1	<b>21st</b> Oklahoma Land Rush came after the Dawes Act ended reservations and encouraged settlers into the plains to take any land not taken by Indian Families - largest land rush was in 1892	<b>22nd</b> Prevention of Great Plague: -Quarantine for 40 days with red crosses on doors of those affected -Ban wrestling -Kill 100,000 cats and dogs -Smoke cigars	<b>23rd</b> Drake's Raid on Cadiz: -Destroyed 30 ships and delayed Armada by a year -Destroyed Spanish supplies -After he did it Drake raided more Spanish areas	<b>24th</b> Propaganda posters are created to manipulate you to think a certain way so sometimes over exaggerated
	<b>25th</b> Indian Appropriations Act: Gave Indians supplies in return for them to stay in reservations	<b>26th</b> Frontline trench - Support trench - Reserve Trench connected by communication trench in zig zags	<b>27th</b> Walter Raleigh planned the journey to Virginia. He never went with the colonists.	<b>28th</b> Rewards for doing well in your job. E.g. cruises, hikes, sport tickets and lectures	<b>29th</b> Joseph McCoy created Abilene, the cowtown, for people to use the train track to sell cattle across America.	<b>30th</b> The Church controlled ideas and attitudes and education so medicine wouldn't change	<b>31st</b> Walsingham placed spies across Europe to spy on possible Catholic revolts or plots
<b>APRIL</b>	<b>1st</b> Spoke out against Nazis and set up the Confessing Church to oppose Nazis	<b>2nd</b> A really bad winter covered up the grass and killed large amount of cattle. Large ranches had to close.	<b>3rd</b> Lister: Antiseptic called Carbolic Acid meant doctors had to clean equipment between surgeries	<b>4th</b> 	<b>5th</b> First violent attack on Jewish people in Germany. Casually dressed SS and German civilians targeted synagogues, businesses and homes of Jewish people	<b>6th</b> Warrior Brotherhood: Men who trained to fight in tribes. Followed their own rules and not the chiefs	<b>7th</b> Public Health Act: - Brought in clear water - Brought in public toilets - Brought in better housing and parks
	<b>8th</b> English strengths: fireships Spanish weakness: Poor communication Other factors: Weather	<b>9th</b> Munich Putsch: 1923 attempt by Hitler and the Nazi party to overthrow the Weimar Republic	<b>11th</b> People who don't work for the law but deal with criminals. Leads to more problems as no trial used	<b>12th</b> 1800s: Painful, infections and blood loss Modern: Technology and machines to aid surgeries	<b>13th</b> 1st Englishman to achieve it. Would encourage others Knighthood on his return onboard the Golden Hind	<b>14th</b> Young people who opposed the Nazis. E.g. listened to illegal American Jazz	<b>15th</b> Men learnt to independently farm, power of the chiefs taken away, children taken to schools
	<b>16th</b> A group of scientists who met to discuss ideas. Approved by the King at the time (Renaissance period)	<b>17th</b> 	<b>18th</b> The Nazis would make their numbers seem better than they were to make them look good	<b>19th</b> Brigham Young was a strong leader. Planned crops along the journey. Migrated in smaller groups with specific roles	<b>20th</b> Patients were awake Doctors wore casual clothes Painful, infections and blood loss	<b>21st</b> Act of Uniformity: Churches look the same and in English (Protestant) Act of Supremacy: Elizabeth becomes Supreme Governor of the Church	<b>22nd</b> Teenagers from middle classes. Wrote anti-Nazi jokes, beat up Hitler Youth, graffiti and grew hair long
	<b>23rd</b> To assimilate them. To create space for settlers to migrate onto. To encourage more settlers	<b>24th</b> Vesalius: Dissected bodies from Renaissance period. Challenged Galen's ideas 300 times!	<b>25th</b> Catholics: Layout of the Churches and Head of Church Puritans: Vestments and crucifixes Nobility: 1/3 recusants	<b>26th</b> Blamed on biggest competitor (Communists) and Hitler got emergency powers from Hindenburg to have an election and grow control of Nazis	<b>27th</b> Plains Indians way of warfare	<b>28th</b> Nightingale training nurses Nightingale cleaning hospitals Creation of NHS	<b>29th</b> Raleigh would lead expedition Wanted 300 colonists with mixture of skills and gender Would leave in plenty of time
<b>MAY</b>	<b>30th</b> Led by Martin Niemoller. Had 4,000 priests who collectively spoke out against the Nazis	<b>1st</b> Cattle reproduced whilst having no owners and grew to 5 million with no owners. Price was low in Texas but expensive in other areas so led to migration	<b>2nd</b> First Aid Nursing Yeomanry Volunteer nurses Drove ambulances with clothes and food in Had cinema and baths in the back of vans to raise morale	<b>3rd</b> Only 108/300 went to Virginia All men so not a long term option Half were soldiers so not correct skills Didn't work together in Virginia	<b>4th</b> Wages increased but so did the price of goods so irrelevant Working hours increased from 42 to 49 a week	<b>5th</b> Ended Indian Reservations in 1888. Led to Indian families being given 160 acres of land to be independent. However land was poor so lots handed it back	<b>6th</b> Free healthcare Spread GPs around Helped with maternity wards Growth in technology for treatment
	<b>7th</b> Debt, religion, MQOS, France, illegitimate, gender, marriage	<b>8th</b> <b>Check the gap analysis - what do you still need to revise?</b>	<b>9th</b> Led to mass migration in 1849 Issues with law and order	<b>10th</b> Royal Army Medical Corps Trained doctors and stretcher bearers Treated major injuries	<b>11th</b> Northern Earls unhappy over religion, their power threatened and money taken away. 1st real threat to Elizabeth	<b>12th</b> Freikorps took over Weimar for 3 days. Put down by workers who went on strike when Freikorps wanted to bring back the Kaiser	<b>13th</b> Creation of first vaccine (smallpox) by Jenner
