
The students signed up to do their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award in October 2021 and a number have managed to complete some of the sections for their award already.

LEGO Robotics Competition

On 12th May 2020, 6 students from Outwood Academy Portland attended the regional final of the 'Tomorrow's Engineers LEGO Robotics' competition which was held at the Sheaf Engineering Building at Sheffield Hallam University.

The Y10 students have spent the past 6 months designing and testing a programmable robot to complete a number of challenges and tasks. These included:

I) Speed Challenge

A race to a fragile wall and back over a distance of 4m. Our students managed this without damaging the wall at all!

2) Robot Challenge

The Robot Challenge consists of a series of missions. Teams try to complete as many as possible under time pressure using the unique robots that they have built.

3) Robot Design

This could be compared to a real-world engineering design review. After completing the speed challenge and missions, our students presented the software and physical designs they had created for the challenge to judges.

4) Research Project

Students researched, designed and presented their own solution to a contemporary engineering problem faced by STEM professionals. This year the students chose to design a solution to the water shortages that are faced by many countries. They had to present their solution to a real engineer, who then asked questions about their ideas.

5) Teamwork Challenge

The group split into two. Half the students got to see a secret Lego object and had to describe it to the remainder of the team to construct. They were not allowed to say some keywords to make the task even more challenging! The judges commended our students on their cooperation and their collaborative solution.

The students met twice per week during enrichment time and split into teams to focus on each of the tasks. At the end of each session, the teams had a debrief where they informed the rest of the group what they had achieved that week and set targets for the next session.

The students had a great day at SHU and demonstrated great levels of maturity and teamwork. Well done to all those students that took part.
